Our next stop was the Springs Market and Springs Country Store in Springs, PA and many of us purchased fresh glazed donuts, YUM! There were local farmers and craftsmen providing fresh picked produce, home baked goodies, antiques, and many plants and flower baskets. We spent about 45 minutes browsing and then headed to Grantsville for a buffet lunch at the Penn Alps Restaurant. The buffet had a large selection of salads, hot foods, rolls, and many desserts. Following lunch we were able to walk around the Spruce Forest Artisan Village, which was just outside the restaurant. There were thirteen restored cabins where people were making baskets, rugs (made on a loom), pottery, etc. The artists showcase and sell their work and visitors can interact with them inside the cabins/studios. There was also a one room schoolhouse where children and adults could get the feel of a classroom from years ago. Lastly, there was the Casselman Bridge, which is currently under repair, and was declared a National Historic Landmark in 1964. The bridge is part of the Casselman River Bridge State Park. Our last stop was ICE CREAM at Shepherd's Farm Ice Cream Shoppe, which was the ending of a perfect day, perfect weather, and perfect information and Map Sheets. n Sunday, July 24th at 9:30, thirteen shiny Miatas started out from Wexford Pennsylvania for a fun filled day of both leisurely and sporty roads, winding our way to two destinations for that day. With plentiful

sunshine, and low humidity, it made for pleasant motoring to Wendell August Forge in Grove City. After that, it was on to North Country Brewing Company in Slippery Rock, Pennsylvania for lunch. Then after more winding roads, the club would complete the day with the drivers and passengers headed back to Evans City with a final stop at Zimmerman's Ice Cream on Main Street.

When we arrived at Wendell August Forge, we were greeted and taken into the new store that is located across from the Grove City Outlets entrance. The original store and forge, which was located in Grove City by the college, was destroyed in a fire in March of 2010. This new flagship store, with its modern interior and exterior, is updated and spacious, and opened in October of 2013. There was some concern that the store might not ever open again, but fortunately they were able to do so. It would have been unfortunate if it hadn't, considering the long history of the forge, because it is the oldest and largest in America. Wendell August Forge was originally founded in Brockway, Pennsylvania by Wendell McMinn August who was thirty eight years old and active in the coal industry at the time. While on the tour of the factory, one of the many interesting facts that we learned about the production of the metal work is that it is an eight step process for each one of the pieces, whether the material used is pewter, sterling silver, or other metals. They also make jewelry there as well.

After an exhilarating drive on fabulous winding roads to Slippery Rock, we arrived at North Country Brewing Company for a wonderful lunch, and great company with our Miata club members. This rustic country spot serves craft beers and homemade root beer along with the usual (but delicious!) pub fare of salads, sandwiches, and burgers. This microbrewery and restaurant was started in 1998 by Jodi and Bob McCafferty in an old storefront with recycled on site materials and local hardwoods. The place opened in 2005, and the yearly brew fests they host have helped raise over \$50,000 for Slippery Rock Development to help maintain Slippery Rock's appearance and upkeep. This, along with other local business owners, is a great way to give back to the community. We would like to say "thank you" again to Ann and Steve Kisak and their son for a great cruise, ordering great weather, having great plans, and for a great time!



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
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
